A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community attachment.

Pacific Islander - A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

### Ethnicity Reporting Methodology

November 28, 2011

The attached data sheet -- student ethnic distribution by college fall 2011-- uses a stepwise segmentation\* methodology. The basis for the segments is the Foothill and De Anza Colleges' strategic planning focus on under-served student populations.

- 1. The stepwise segmentation gives priority to 1) Latinos 2) African Americans and 3) Filipinos (in this order). For example, if a student selects Hispanic: Mexican and African American they will be grouped as Hispanic.
- 2. This report includes ethnic combinations of 50 or more students (for example, students selecting both Chinese and Vietnamese).
- 3. If a given combination has less than 50 students then the ethnic group (Latino, African American, Asian, Filipino, Native American, Pacific Islander, White) is reported instead of the specific ethnicity combination. This grouping will still use the stepwise segmentation approach outlined above.

<sup>\*</sup> Stepwise Segmentation is an approach with a defined group of respondents first "pulled out" into a group and the remaining respondents then broken into other groups in similar fashion. The result is mutually exclusive groups.
