SYLLABUS

Scope: This course is designed to expose you to a wide range of art history from the Baroque period through the dawning of Impressionism. We will explore the fascinating developments of painting, sculpture, and architecture in these periods, and how all of these different artistic expressions were often interrelated. Included in this chronological survey, we will also investigate and assess the role art plays in contemporary cultures and societies. All lectures are asynchronous, and can be watched at any time that is convenient for you.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Students will analyze the social experiences of artists, demonstrating how artists' relationships with their patrons was a defining factor in the production of works of art.
- Students will demonstrate visual literacy and critical thinking skills by evaluating diverse scholarly perspectives when interpreting works of art.
- Students will investigate different techniques utilized in the production of works of art through written analysis based on firsthand evaluation of art objects in local collections.

Readings: The text is recommended, but not required.

Kleiner, Fred S. Gardner's Art through the Ages: The Western Perspective. 15th edition Volume 2. Boston: Cengage Learning, 2017.

If you find another edition for less money, please feel free to use it! The reading assignments are correlated with the class discussions, and are listed below.

Exams: There will be a combination of 11 quizzes, one midterm examination and one final examination. The quizzes will consist of multiple choice questions. The midterm and final will be one or two free response questions. **NOTE:** in accordance with De Anza College regulations, if you opt not to take the final exam, you will NOT pass the class. NO makeup exams will be given except in cases of emergencies.

Paper: The paper assignment will require a virtual or in-person trip to a museum, and will consist of an analysis of one or two pieces of art. Further details will be discussed in class.
