GOAL 10: MEETING BASIC NEEDS

The rate of basic needs challenges – including homelessness, housing insecurity, food insecurity and mental health issues – reported by Black, Filipinx, Foster Youth, Latinx, LGBTQ+, Native American and Pacific Islander students will be no more than 5 percentage points different from the rate for all other students, as measured by the annual basic needs survey.



eAnza ollege Areas of Focus (Proposed)

Faced with a **continuing enrollment decline** and incorporating input from the **strategic planning process** thus far, we are proposing that we focus on **five** main areas:

- 1. Continue to attract **traditional student populations**, including those from **historically underrepresented** communities
- 2. Emphasize retention efforts within the classroom
- 3. Strengthen retention efforts beyond the classroom
- 4. Target pockets of enrollment growth
- 5. Continue to **integrate transfer and CTE** pathways and align with **high-demand careers**



Emerging from the Pandemic

- Prior to the pandemic, 79% of enrollment was in-person or hybrid (combination of in-person and online), and 21% was fully online.
- As we transition post-pandemic and respond to student needs, it is possible to adjust the way in which we have historically offered instruction.
- We anticipate students will want a large selection of hybrid offerings, with many in-person classes including an online component.



Faculty, Staff and Students on Modality

- Based on polling in Workshop #4, attendees indicated 50-60% of classes need to be offered with an in-person component during the next five years in order to best serve students
- Surveys about preferred modality are being distributed to continuing students beginning today; new students will be surveyed after they apply starting May 1 and as they RSVP for Enrollment Day to be held April 30







Summary of Updates


Based on feedback shared so far, the following changes were made:

- Incorporated Student Success Factors into the fabric of the institutional initiatives, rather than listing as a stand-alone metric
- Added Foster Youth, LGBTQ+ and Native American, Pacific Islander to the student population areas of focus
- Added back Filipinx students to the student population areas of focus
- Added Mental Health to the Basic Needs goal



Outreach

- Staffing to support wraparound services (e.g., foster youth counselor, social worker)
- Formal and informal mentorship opportunities (e.g., mentoring, tutoring)
- Early engagement (e.g., middle school and high school partnerships and pathways)





Student-Centered Instruction and Services

- Professional development and support for classroom teaching (e.g., AB 705 support, high-impact practices)
- Support for all employees in equity work (e.g., financial commitments, support for classified professionals)
- Visioning and streamlining collegewide practices (e.g., enrollment management, curriculum, stacked certificates)





Retention

- Focus on nontraditional students (e.g., foster youth, part-time)
- Basic needs and mental health (e.g., centralized services, intrusive messaging, focus groups
- Proactive intervention strategies (e.g., focus groups, student fines, student employment)
- Greater connections between major and career options (e.g., internships, pathways to careers aligned with their major)





Civic Capacity for Community and Social Change

- Community-based learning projects (e.g., optional or required engagement activities)
- Leadership opportunities for students (e.g., peer mentor groups, tutoring, pay student government)
- Partnerships with community organizations (e.g., internships, employment/volunteering within the community)
- Preparation and support of incoming student leaders for shared governance expectations, roles and responsibilities (e.g., orientation, mentoring, training)

 - Draft EMP reviewed by College Planning Committee
- May 2-6: Draft EMP posted on Strategic Planning webpage
- May 9 (1-2 p.m.): Review of Draft Strategic Plan
- May 2-12: Submit feedback on draft to CPC representatives
- May 12: CPC meets to review
- May 19: College Council first review
- June 9: College Council final review and approval
