"STAYING VISIBLE -- The Importance of Archives" is an exhibit of the art and "saved stuff" of eleven artists working during different decades in different locations in 20th Century California. The art includes paintings, etchings, drawings, sculptures, quilts, wearable art, and ceramics. The "saved stuff" includes videotape and audiotape interviews (which can be seen in the gallery), photographs, letters, announcements, reviews and catalogs, quotes from personal conversations, memorabilia and more.

"STAYING VISIBLE -- The Importance of Archives" is an exhibit about how we record artists, what information we gather about them, who gathers it, where it goes, what happens to it . . . and eventually how artists get into history books.

The "saved stuff" is part of important information gathered about each artist by thirteen researchers. Much of the information will be entered in the Archives of California Art at the Oakland Museum and in other archives after the show is over.
