Subject: Transfers to Four-Year Institution, 2019-20

Overview:

This report reflect data for De Anza College students who transferred to the University of California (UC), California State University (CSU), in-state private or out-of-state institutions between 2015-16 and 2019-20.

Methodology:

All transfer data were externally sourced from the websites listed below.

Summary:

Transfer by Institution Type

- In 2019-20, De Anza students continued to transfer primarily to a CSU (1,411), followed by UC (903), out-of-state (903) and in-state private (57) institution.
- When compared to the previous year, transfer headcounts decreased across all institution types: in-state private (-14%), CSU (-10%), UC (-1%) and out-of-state (-1%). Total transfers decreased by -182 or -7%.

UC Transfer:

- The UC system provides data on transfer applicants, admits and enrollees. The headcounts of De Anza students who applied and were admitted increased in 2019-20 from the prior year by +2% and +3%, respectively. However, the enrollment headcount decreased by -1%, a declining trend that is observed since 2017-18.
- De Anza student' admittance rate to the UC system in 2019-20 was 78%. International (85%) and Asian (77%) students had the highest admittance rates. African American students consistently have the lowest rate of UC admits. Their admittance rate in 2019-20 was 68%.

- De Anza student' enrollment rate to the UC system in 2019-20 was 74%. Asian (76%) and International (75%) students had the highest enrollment rates, whereas the enrollment rates for African American (59%), Latinx (65%) and White (70%) students trailed.
- Davis (196), San Diego (182) and Berkeley (143) were the top UC destinations.

CSU Transfer:

- Asian (39%) and Latinx (23%) students accounted for the majority of all De Anza students who transferred to a CSU campus.
- San Jose (951), San Francisco (135) and Cal State East Bay (94) were the top CSU destinations.

In-State Private and Out-of-State Transfer:

- More De Anza students transferred to an out-of-state institution than an in-state private institution, 77% vs. 23%.
- The top four in-state private institutions students transferred to were Ashford University, Santa Clara University, University of San Francisco and University of Southern California.
- The top out-of-state transfer destinations were Thunderbird School of Global Management (AZ), Western Governors University (UT), Southern New Hampshire University (NH) and University of Phoenix (AZ). Most of these institutions are marketed as online institutions.

Transfer Comparison with Neighboring Community Colleges

- De Anza College had the highest total transfers among the nine community colleges in the Foothill-De Anza, San Jose-Evergreen, San Mateo County and West Valley-Mission Community College Districts.
- De Anza had fewer transfers across all institution types with total transfer headcounts decreasing by -182 from 2018-19 to 2019-20. The opposite finding was observed for West Valley College (+111). The remaining community colleges also saw gains in their total transfer headcount, notably San Jose City College (+95), Foothill College (+74) and Cañada College (+65).

A. Transfer by Institution Type

- In 2019-20, the majority of De Anza students who transferred to a four-year institution were more likely to transfer to a CSU (1,411), followed by UC (903), out-of-state (903) and in-state private (57) institution. This finding is consistent with previous years.
- Transfer headcount decreased from 2018-19 to 2019-20 across all categories. In total, transfers decreased by -182 or -7%.



B. University of California

B1. Transfer Admittance and Enrollment Headcount Trend

• In 2019-20, the number of De Anza students who applied and were admitted to the UC system was 1,569 and 1,228, respectively, and represented an increase of +2% and +3% over the prior year. A total of 903 students enrolled, which is a decrease of 10 students (-1%) from 2018-19.



B2. Transfer Admittance and Enrollment Rate

- Similar to the prior years, the admittance rate of those who applied was 78%.
- The enrollment rate of those admitted was 74% and is the lowest rate in the past five years.



B3. Transfer Admittance and Enrollment Rate by Ethnicity

- De Anza's Asian and International students continue to comprise the majority of applicants, admits and enrollees to the UC campus. In 2019-20, they accounted for 72% of all applicants, 74% of all admits and 76% of all enrollees. For details on the admittance and enrollment of each student group by year, see <u>Appendix A</u>.
- Figure 3 provides the admittance rate by ethnicity. Consistent with prior years, International (85%) and Asian (77%) had the highest admittance rates in 2019-20.
- With the exception of International students, all ethnic groups' admittance rates trailed the average rate of 78%, with the lowest rate observed for African American (68%). While African American student's admittance rate increased from the prior year (58%), they consistently have the lowest admittance rates among De Anza UC admits.
- Figure 4 provides the enrollment rate by ethnicity. Asian (76%) and International (75%) students had the highest enrollment rates in 2019-20.
- African American (59%), Latinx (65%) and White (70%) enrollment rates trailed the average rate of 74%.







De Anza College Transfer to UC System: Admittance Rate by Ethnicity

Applicants fewer than five and admits or enrollees fewer than three are not reported by the UCOP Infocenter. As a result, data for Native American and Unknown ethnic groups are not consistently reported each year; and therefore, they are not displayed in the figure.







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B4. Transfer by Campus

• In 2019-20, Davis (196), San Diego (182) and Berkeley (143) continued to be the top three UC destinations for De Anza students. Together, they accounted for 58% of all De Anza transfers to the UC system.

• The only UC campuses to see an increase in transfer headcount compared to the prior year were Berkeley (+37), San Diego (+27) and Irvine (+1). UC campuses whose transfer headcount decreased by -20% or more were Santa Barbara (-26), Santa Cruz (-26) and Riverside (-7).

• Table 3 provides the average GPA of De Anza applicants, admits and enrollees to the UC system. Focusing on the top three UC campuses students transferred to (i.e. Davis, San Diego and Berkeley), the average GPA of enrolled students were 3.46, 3.60 and 3.77, respectively.

C. California State University

C1. Transfer by Campus

- In 2019-20, consistent with the prior years, San Jose (951), San Francisco (135) and Cal State East Bay (94) were the top three top CSU destinations for De Anza students. Although these three campuses accounted for the largest share of De Anza transfer students (84%) to the CSU system, they each had 30 to 50 fewer transfer students when compared to 2018-19.
- From 2018-19 to 2019-20, Long Beach (+7), San Diego (+7), Sacramento (+5), Fresno (+4), Bakersfield (+2) and Dominquez Hills (+2) transfer student headcount increased. Campuses that decreased by -50% or more include Humboldt (-8), Los Angeles (-5), Maritime (-1), Northridge (-10), Pomona (-14), San Bernardino (-1) and Stanislaus (-12).

C2. Transfer by Ethnicity

- Asian (39%) and Latinx (23%) students comprised the majority of De Anza students who transferred to a CSU campus. This finding is consistent with previous years.
- Across all student subgroups, transfer headcount to the CSU system decreased from 2018-19 to 2019-20. Asian/Pacific Islander (-105), Latinx (-17) and Non-Resident Alien (-17) had the largest headcount decrease.
- While African American transfer students did not have the same amount of decrease as their • ethnic counterparts, because there are fewer De Anza African American CSU transfers in general, they experienced the largest percentage decrease of all student groups (-25%), from 44 in 2018-19 to 33 in 2019-20.

D. In-State Private and Out-of-State

D1. Transfer by Institution Type

- In 2019-20, among De Anza students who transferred to an in-state private or out-of-state institution, the majority of them opted for an out-of-state institution (77%).
- Compared to 2018-19, transfer headcount to in-state private and out-of-state institutions declined in 2019-20 with the largest decrease observed for in-state private (-9 or -14%).

D2. Top Transfer to In-State Private and Out-of-State Institutions

The top four in-state private and out-of-state institutions De Anza students transferred to in 2019-20 is provided in Table 7.

- In-State Private: With the exception of the University of Southern California and Ashford University, the remaining two institutions are located in the Bay Area.
- Out-of-State: Thunderbird School Of Global Management promotes itself for global leadership, management and business. The other three out-of-state institutions are primarily marketed as online institutions.

E. Transfer Comparison with Neighboring Community Colleges

This section compares the transfer headcount of community colleges in the Foothill-De Anza, San Jose-Evergreen, San Mateo County and West Valley-Mission Community College Districts.

• In 2019-20, De Anza College had the most transfer headcount, totalling 2,567 students. This finding is consistent by institution type as well. Foothill College had the second highest total transfers (1,207).

Transfer Headcount by Community College, 2019-20

- Despite leading in transfer headcount, when compared to the previous year, De Anza was the only college to have decreased transfers across all institution types, whereas the opposite was observed for West Valley College.
- West Valley College had the highest gains in total transfer among the nine community colleges (+111). The remaining colleges also saw gains in their total transfer headcount, notably San Jose City College (+95), Foothill College (+74) and Cañada College (+65).
