Homework: Homework will be assigned, but will not be graded. It is expected that you do the homework to understand the topics on both the labs and the exams.

Group work: There will be group activities daily during the course that will be graded. Group work will be submitted in Canvas.

Discussion: Each week I will post a topic on the Discussion board. You will get points for participating constructively on these discussion topics.

Exams: There will be 4 midterm exams during the quarter given on Canvas. Each of these three exams is worth 10% of the grade. Your lowest exam score will be dropped. There will be a flexible 3 day window to complete each exam.

There are no make-up exams.

Labs: You will use Mintab and other statistical software in analyzing data, learning statistical models and working on the class material. Computer labs can be done in groups of no more than four people for a common grade and be turned in by the due date.

Final: The final will not be an exam, but will be individual, one-on-one assessments where you will be asked to explain a research report. The research reports will be different for each student and you will meet with me for about 10 to 15 minutes on Zoom to demonstrate an understanding of the concepts covered in class.

Adding/Dropping: If you choose not to complete the course, it is your responsibility to officially drop or withdraw from the course by the deadline date.

Attendance: This online class will be given synchronous meaning that we will meet online at the scheduled class times. We will also have in-class time for group work and labs. We will also have in-class time for group work and labs, which are an essential part of the course. I plan to record each lecture part of the class; you are still responsible for participating in and completing group work and labs.
