Prerequisites: To be in this class you must earn a qualifying score on the placement test or pass ESL 234/444.

Course Description: This class focuses on the development of English speaking, listening, reading and writing skills. Students will practice writing simple, compound, and complex sentences; write short paragraphs and letters; develop reading comprehension and vocabulary-building skills; and practice oral communication skills.

Required Materials

-Focus on Grammar 3: An Integrated Skills Approach, Fuchs, Westheimer, and Bonner, Fifth Edition (ISBN: 9780134583297)

-English-English Dictionary (Longman Advanced Dictionary is recommended)

Course Objectives

- Listen to, comprehend, and infer meaning from dialogues, conversations, discussion, and other passages.
- Speak appropriate American English in a given situation.
- Read for comprehension and analysis.
- Write short paragraphs.
- Comprehend and use level specific grammar.
- Expand vocabulary relating to student's experience and class materials.
- Discuss and analyze cross-cultural customs and attitudes, especially in contrast with the students' native customs and attitudes.

Course Content

1. Homework: Most of your homework will be assigned from the textbook and Canvas. It is your responsibility to prepare your homework carefully at home and complete **all** the assigned exercises. Homework answers will be checked during the class.

2. Class Participation: Class participation is extremely important because it gives you the opportunity to use and practice your English skills. You will often work with your classmates in pairs and small groups to discuss homework, share ideas, and practice listening and speaking. In order to participate in class, you must come to class prepared and on time.

3. Quizzes: We will have quizzes that will test reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammar, writing, and listening and speaking skills.

4. Oral Presentations: Each student will give 3 brief presentations for the quarter. The presentation topics will be based on the readings from the materials of ESL 244/444.

5. Compositions: Students will write 6 brief compositions for the class. The composition should be no longer than one page, double-spaced and word-processed. Ideas, organization, grammar and usage will be evaluated.

7. Exams: You will have a midterm and final exam. The exams will test listening skills, vocabulary, reading comprehension, grammar, and writing.

NOTE: No make-up quizzes or exams will be given.
