SYLLABUS

Scope: This course is designed to expose you to a wide range of architectural history. We will explore the fascinating developments of structures through time from predominantly a Western perspective. While the course is essentially sequential, we will take various sundry side trips to locations and time periods not covered in the textbook. Included in this chronological survey of architecture, we will also investigate and assess the roles architecture plays in cultures and societies.

Student Learning Outcomes: Students will analyze the social experience of architects, demonstrating how architects' relationship with their patrons was and is a defining factor in the production of buildings and monuments. Students will demonstrate visual literacy and critical thinking skills by evaluating diverse scholarly perspectives when interpreting works of architecture. Students will investigate the different techniques utilized in the production of works of architecture through written analysis based on firsthand evaluation of local buildings.

Readings: The text is strongly encouraged, but not required.

The reading assignments are correlated with the class discussions, and are listed below.

Exams: There will be one short quiz every week, for a total of 11 quizzes. Each quiz will be multiple choice. In addition, there will be one midterm and one final exam that will consist of free response questions. **NOTE:** in accordance with De Anza College regulations, if you opt not to take the final exam, you will NOT pass the class. NO makeup exams will be given except in the case of emergencies.

Paper: The paper assignment will require a virtual trip to a structure, and will consist of an analysis of its history, how it fits into its particular time period, and how it is utilized. Further details will be discussed in class as the due date nears.
