- Homework Assignments: You will have homework from our student text. You will turn this homework in at the end of the quarter.
- Participation: You will have many opportunities to work together in pairs or small groups. You must make every effort to participate in all classroom activities. Remember, the more you do, the more you will improve. I encourage you to be courageous, take risks and make mistakes! Anyone not participating fully will receive a lower participation grade.
- Quizzes: There will be weekly quizzes based on the chapters in our student text.
- Exams: You will take a midterm and a final which will include listening.
- Public Speaking Situations: You will give two oral presentations to the class. These will be on a topic which I will give you ahead of time. Your oral presentation should be memorized as much as possible, although the use of notes is allowed. However, points will be deducted for reading your presentation entirely. Presentations should be NO LONGER than 1 minute each. You will be able to see the presentation guidelines on CANVAS.
- Listening Journals: You will be required to write weekly listening journals, which you will share in class. You will write one entry a week. You should write a one paragraph summary and a one paragraph response to something you listen to: a news story, a television program, a podcast, etc. You will turn your journal in once at the midterm and once at the end of the quarter. You should bring your journal to every

class since you will be expected to share it with your classmates. Failure to bring your journal will affect your class participation and your journal grade. You will be able to see the journal guidelines on CANVAS.

You will have occasional discussion questions in video format on CANVAS. You will have the chance to answer the question with an audio or a video of your own! Those who answer will get an extra participation point for each question which is answered.
